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She is a full Professor in the Department of Public Health and Community Medicine, Faculty of Medicine, Andalas University and is Dean, Faculty of Nursing Andalas University. She has lead and/or supported research through funding from WHO, Global Fund, USAID and other agencies. She has substantial experience with community engagement and outreach to marginalized populations, particularly through many years of community-based work in tuberculosis with CEPAT (Community Empowerment People against Tuberculosis) project. The work has involved community driven interventions to reduce discrimination and stigma among remote and poor communities. Dr. Delyuzar is head of the North Sumatera, Aceh, West Sumatra, and Community in TB Control and Treatment program. He is also cooperating with partners in the Empowerment of Community in TB Control and Treatment program. He brought in 20 community-based workers for deployment, strategic planning, and implementation with project counterparts, such as WHO, UNICEF, and USAID.
